At a low 8:1 student to faculty ratio in clinicals and labs, students can build strong relationships with their faculty mentor and receive direct feedback.

Education and training for nursing excellence – Our clinical learning requirements are among the most rigorous in the country.



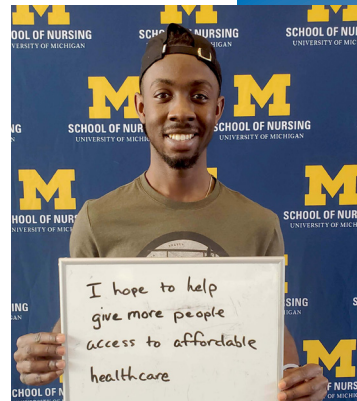
A Welcoming Community, Committed To Health For All

Student organizations

Future Black Healthcare Professionals (FBHP)

FBHP creates a safe atmosphere for future Black healthcare professionals and promotes inter-professionalism and understanding among varying health care professions. Members of the organization aim to increase diversity in health-related fields on campus and within the local community.

Men in Nursing Initiative

Developed in collaboration with Michigan Medicine and the U-M School of Nursing, the Men in Nursing Initiative is open to all nursing students. Our Campus

Situated less than a mile from the nationally-renowned University of Michigan Medical Center on the university's main campus, the U-M School of Nursing's academic facilities are housed in two buildings standing a few hundred feet apart on North Ingalls Street in Ann Arbor, Michigan. Opened in 2015, the four-story 426 North Ingalls Building houses a majority of the school's state-of-the-art classroom spaces along with the Clinical Learning Center. In addition to five classrooms, the first two floors of the building are dedicated to shared space where students can comfortably gather for group work, host events or find a private nook to study or unwind in between classes.



Media learning center classrooms are designed with collaboration in mind. Each stationary pod is equipped with its own flat panel display and integrated computer.

The Clinical Learning Center provides a state-of-the-art space for students to hone their skills in a wide variety of realistic health care scenarios.



Throughout the 426 North Ingalls Building, you will find cozy spaces to study or relax, equipped with large screens with laptop connectivity to allow student collaboration and easy-to-access power strips to recharge your devices.



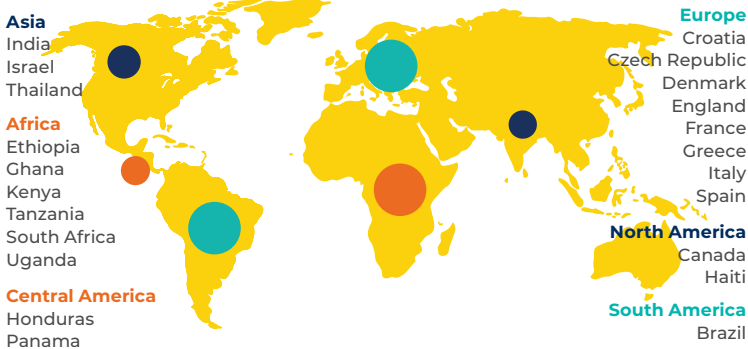
Our state-of-the-art Clinical Learning Center (CLC) engages our students in a dynamic, experiential learning environment. As part of the CLC, the skills lab is used to develop basic and advanced skills allowing the students to apply their knowledge of nursing theory in an interactive, challenging, and safe learning environment.

Global health at Michigan

As a student at the U-M School of Nursing you have access to one of the most robust global health learning networks available. With a rich tradition of global health programming and outreach, the School of Nursing has been designated a Collaborating Center for the World Health Organization (WHO) and the Pan-American Health Organization (PAHO) for 25 years.

Undergraduate students at the U-M School of Nursing have a unique opportunity to declare a minor in Population Health in a Global Context. The minor expands on the undergraduate curriculum to allow students to more fully explore global health through a variety of courses and a required field experience, providing opportunities to examine health care processes and systems at the global level.
