Excellence in Research: Christopher Friese PhD, RN, AOCN, FAAN

(Nominated by Dr. Milisa Manojlovich)



Dr. Friese has an outstanding track record of research in oncology nursing, with a focus quality and safety in chemotherapy care. He is currently the PI or co-PI for 7 grants and has over 80 publications. In 2016, he was awarded a one-year health policy fellowship in Washington DC by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, serving in the United States Senate. In 2018, he was

appointed by the Comptroller General of the United States to serve a six-year term on the Patient-Centered Outcomes Research Institute (PCORI) Board of Governors. He actively encourages research activities by mentoring honors students and junior faculty.

Excellence in Leadership: Bonnie Hagerty, PhD, RN (Nominated by: Dr. Ann Kruszewski)



Dr. Hagerty has a long career in leadership positions at the School of Nursing. Most notably, as Associate Dean for Undergraduate Studies she led the transformation of the undergraduate curriculum, leading to graduates' consistently high NCLEX score and success in the workplace and graduate school. She was a leader in developing collaborative partner-

ships with Michigan Medicine and interprofessional learning experiences.

Excellence in Education: Rhonda Schoville, PhD, MSBA, RN



(Nominated by Dr. Michelle Aebersold) Dr. Schoville uses many innovative teaching approaches and designed a new master's program in Leadership, Analytics, and Innovation using digital education concepts. Dr. Schoville's teaching approaches include storytelling, animation, guest lectures, reflection assignments, and team projects.

She is highly respected by students for her experience in nursing leadership and informatics and her concern for their success.

Excellence in Practice: Regi Freeman MSN, RN, ACNS-BC, FCNS



(Nominated by Cristina Wojack) As a Clinical Nurse Specialist in the Cardiovascular ICU, Regi Freeman represents excellence by emphasizing staff education and evidence-based practice. She works tirelessly on Nursing Quality Indicators like pressure injuries, fall reduction, hand hygiene, pain reassessment, medication safety, allowing the nurses to become "best" in their field. She dissemi-

nates nursing knowledge through publications on cardiovascular nursing.

Friend of Nursing: Geoffrey Hoffman, PhD, MPH (Nominated by Julia Morrissey, MSN, RN, NE-BC)



Dr. Hoffman is absolutely committed to enhancing patient outcomes through policy change and honest, transparent discussion. Research and Evidence-Based Practice Project Grant

Nathan Stefanovsky is a DNP student at the UM School of Nursing. The Rho grant will support his project, Feasibility and Acceptability of Motivational Interviewing as an Approach to Reducing the Negative Health Effects of Noise Exposure among Agricultural Producers in Western Michigan. To address the problem of noise exposure among agricultural producers in western Michigan, Nathan's project is designed to establish evidence-based MI guidelines to improve producer adherence to the use of noise control strategies. The protocol will be evaluated based on the CDC standards used to evaluate the effectiveness of health programs, (utility, feasibility, propriety, and accuracy). Nathan will be working with Dr. Marjorie McCullaugh.
